- Self Check in. The patient will arrive and check once they are in the office. Time Efficiency
- Medical Billing; Capture the total amounts. The system helps to setup a payment process. This system will show what insurance will cover, what patient will pay and how to pay back based on desired payment or time to pay back.
- Updates for medical records are live to be utilized by patient. The patient will have access to these documents to give them to new providers or anyone they wish.
